Celebrating 10 Years of Fun, Learning, and Growing.

The Discovery Center celebrated its 10th birthday in 2021. Over the past 10 years, the organization has grown significantly, gaining prominence as a regional tourist attraction and community anchor for families.

The Discovery Center features 15,000 square feet of indoor exhibits exploring science, careers, art, building and more, and a 4.5-acre certified Nature Explore Outdoor Classroom.

The museum has continued to add new play experiences, and hosted five major traveling exhibitions in the past 10 years.

Access Discovery Programs, which ensure museum access for all children, now account for more than 10 percent of admissions, and thousands more children have been served in community outreach events designed to inspire a lifelong love of learning for every child.

Since opening in 2011, the museum has hosted more than 770,000 visitors from all 50 states and 23 countries.

Advocates for Children

Every child deserves rich and diverse museum experiences.

More than 1 in 10 Discovery Center admissions are free or donor-subsidized. In 2021, these admissions included *Museums for All* visitors from families receiving TANF or WIC, families with subsidized memberships and field trip visitors from schools with a high percentage of children receiving free or reduced-cost lunches.

Special programs serve children with incarcerated mothers, medically fragile children, children with an autism spectrum disorder and foster families.

New in 2021: Foster Family Program

Supports children in foster care with healing play experiences in the museum and community.

In 2021, this program provided free memberships, crisis sensory kits and STEAM summer camps designed for the unique needs of children in foster care.





Discovery Kindergarten

Promotes a communitywide initiative to have every child ready for kindergarten.

Play Free

Helps children with incarcerated caregivers get the love and support they need to heal.

In 2021, this program mailed educational play kits to children and play guides to mothers to enhance virtual visits.

Discovery Baby

Gives first-time parents the tools they need to begin a lifetime of learning.

Free Nights

Unites the whole community in play and learning at no cost to families.

Sensory-Friendly Sundays

Provides children who have autism spectrum disorders with a safe and understanding place to play.

In 2021, a partnership with the Guggenheim Museum brought children at the Discovery Center and New York's Central Park together virtually to create art.

Museums for All

Increases access to low-income families so finances are never a barrier to play.

Medical Warriors

Honors medically fragile children or those battling life-limiting illnesses who need private play time.

A snowy adventure in science and dramatic play that engaged families in beautiful and educational fun.

Outreach Highlight:

New Play Space in Marysville offers serious fun close to home

Building on work in 2020 to install play spaces in local parks, in 2021 the Discovery Center planned and constructed an educational play area in Marysville, Kansas, in partnership with *All in for Kansas Kids*, a project of the Children's Cabinet.

The Play Space design was workshopped with members of the Marysville community using Zoom calls to gain feedback and get ideas for design elements. The result is a space that draws heavily on Marysville's local culture and history, while integrating play and school readiness information.

Mobile Museum

Serves families in outreach events across the state of Kansas, where visitors can build, paint and play.

Corporate Play Days

Promotes the power of play for all ages with facilitated, play-based team-building for former children.

STEAM Ahead to Discovery Library Kits

Museum educators produce STEAMbased literacy and learning kits in partnership with the Topeka and Shawnee County Public Library.

Discovery at Home

Over 165 free online learning activities, developed during the pandemic closure, continue to serve as a resource to families all over the world.

The museum survived the pandemic despite losing 93% of projected revenue in 2020. Local and regional visitors are confidently returning to a museum full of new experiences alongside familiar favorites. The Discovery Center will continue to serve families, but only with donor support.




